



USBC ANNOUNCES PROGRAM TO RETAIN NEW LEAGUE BOWLERS

To be eligible for ranking in the 2011-2012 season, adults must bowl a minimum of 66 games in at least two NCAUSBCA-certified leagues (NCAUSBCA-certified travel leagues included) held in two different centers. Women must bowl in each event of the 2012 NCAUSBCA Women's Championship Tournament; men must bowl in each event of the 2012 NCAUSBCA Open Championship Tournament. Scores bowled by women in the Open Championship Tournament will be included with the required qualifying totals for ranking purposes. Ranking guidelines appear [here](#).

The leading brands in the bowling industry are teaming up with the United States Bowling Congress to create an aggressive new program designed to engage and retain first-time league bowlers. The new USBC Welcome to Bowling program is scheduled to launch in the fall and will include exclusive offers providing new league bowlers access to proper equipment and coaching. "Our data shows that 63 percent of first-year USBC bowlers do not come back to join a league the next year," said USBC Executive Director Stu Upson. "Industry research shows the primary reasons new bowlers quit the sport is they feel uncomfortable about their equipment and ability. A proper ball and some basic instruction appear to be the keys to reversing the trend." The USBC Welcome to Bowling program will be offered exclusively to 2011-2012 season USBC members who have not been members the last three years. These new USBC members will receive an invitation to take advantage of special offers designed to hook them on the sport. Key elements of the program include: "USBC Welcome to Bowling" Ball Offer, "USBC Welcome to Bowling" Coaching Offer, and "USBC Welcome to Bowling" Coaching Tips and Video Series ([click here](#) for program details). "USBC and the bowling industry must act to address this key challenge of retaining first-year bowlers," Upson said. "Our goal is for this new initiative to become something the entire industry can benefit from."

Fred Dailey of Woodbridge, Va., recorded two 800 series within a five-day period in the Tuesday Nite Tenpinners league at Bowl America Shirley and in the Colonial Virginia Open in Williamsburg, where he captured the scratch all events and singles as well as the handicap doubles with Adam Martin of Dale City, Va. Meanwhile, Edrick Bracey of Columbia, Md., and Marcus Nelson of Suitland, Md., took top honors in the scratch doubles. ... Roto Grip recently announced that the first person to roll a USBC-certified 900 series in league competition with either of its two newest balls in the Sword™ line — the Bandit™ and/or the Outlaw™ — will win \$100,000. Official rules, restrictions, and contest details are available [here](#). ... The local bowling community was shocked and saddened to learn of the July 21 death of Youth coach Lamont Bush of Waldorf, Md. Bush, who bowled last season in the Jimmy Jones Memorial and Jimmy Jones Trios leagues at AMF Waldorf, was 47. Survivors include his wife, Vicky, and daughter, Briana.

LeCount M. Hughes Jr. of Beltsville, Md., recently was suspended from membership in USBC and is never to hold office. ... Robin M. Selvage of Triangle, Va., has been reinstated to membership in USBC and again becomes eligible to compete in USBC leagues and tournaments with all of the attendant membership privileges.

Due to incorrect submissions, 2010-2011 season averages for bowlers in the Woodbridge Handicap Trio league at Bowl America Woodbridge are not correct in the current Annual Averages book. The correct averages for these bowlers (with league code WB019) and for Grace A. Alexander (165 average / 105 games in RD003) and Ernie G. Kadlick (134 / 28 in SG001) appear on the association's Web site at ncausbca.org.

MANAGER'S MEMO • RAY BROTHERS

Knowledgeable league bowlers help make better leagues

Fall leagues are holding their organizational meetings, so all team captains and bowlers should attend these meetings and voice their opinions about the rules of the league and how the league should be run for the season.

A few things to keep in mind:

- The league's board of directors, which consists of the team captains and league officers, makes the decisions dealing with how the league is governed. League officers cannot make decisions without consulting the board of directors.
- The bank statement *must* be sent to the president of the league. Failure to do this will have an effect on the bonding for your league.
- The secretary has 30 days to forward the league application and all membership requests to the association. Sub-

mission any later than that also will affect the bonding of your league.

- The league president is required to appoint an audit committee and a prize committee (keeping in mind that the prize lists must be presented to the league members by the *fifth* week of bowling). He/She also should consider appointing a postponement committee.

All league members should be aware of these provisions and make sure the league officers carry out their duties. If anyone has any questions, do not hesitate to contact me. If I don't know the answer, which is rare, I will get an answer for you.

The dates and sites for most of this season's tournaments have been set:

- **Senior** – October 22-23, 29-30 at Bowl America Gaithersburg.
- **Mixed** (in support of BVL) – November 5-6, 12-13 at AMF Annandale.
- **Youth** – March 3-4, 10-11 at Bowl America Bull Run.
- **Women** – March 3-4, 10-11, 17-18 at Bowl America Burke.
- **Open** – April 14-15, 21-22, 28-29 at Bowl America Woodbridge and Bowl America Shirley.

Make sure to sign up early to obtain the dates and times you most desire.

When you go to practice, bring a friend and introduce him or her to this great sport and explain the benefits of belonging to a league.

On August 1, we welcomed Jane Andrews as the new president of our organization. I have known Jane for more years than I care to remember, and I am sure she will do an excellent job.

Here's hoping that this season is the best you have ever had. As Roy Rogers said, "Happy Trails."



NCAUSBCA Hall of Fame to welcome McMullen, Warboy, and Williams

Seneca Creek State Park in Gaithersburg to host October 8 Induction Celebration

Hollis F. McMullen has been a long-time member of our association and has distinguished himself as both a high-quality



scratch bowler and a leader in our sport with his organization of events for the scratch bowler. He has bowled for more than 30 years and has been a member of the Professional Bowlers Association for over 10 years. He lists among his many bowling accomplishments numerous cashes in PBA events, including a fifth-place finish in the 2005 PBA Senior Manassas Open Tournament. Hollis continues to participate in multiple leagues and tournaments.

Several years ago, he saw a need for a competitive league to be conducted on tough lane conditions. He organized and successfully ran such a league at AMF Alexandria. Many of this area's premier bowlers credit Hollis's league with helping them understand how to play the more competitive conditions they encounter at out-of-town tournaments.

In 2003, Hollis returned PBA action to our area for the first time in over a decade by organizing and personally funding a PBA Senior Tour national event at Bowl America Manassas. In spite of the cost and the limited support he received from our local bowling community, he persevered and was able to support the senior professionals for five years.

Throughout the run of these tournaments, Hollis provided an opportunity for this area's bowlers to see and participate with some of the icons of bowling. The pro-am portion of the 2007 tournament attracted over 250 area bowlers, giving them the opportunity to bowl on the same lanes with multiple PBA Hall of Fame members holding well over 200 PBA national titles. The enthusiasm and excitement that was demonstrated can only be a positive for the future of bowling in our area.

Hollis F. McMullen is truly one of the good guys in our association. His tireless—and financial—efforts to return professional bowling to the area and his desire to provide a challenging bowling experience for those who wish to take their games to higher levels make him a worthy addition to the NCAUSBCA Hall of Fame.

Michael J. Warboy has been a long-time member of our association and has distinguished himself as both a scratch bowler and



a leader in our sport. He started bowling in a youth league at Fair Lanes Bowie at age 12. Five years later in 1975, he set a Vir-Mar District Junior Bowling Association record with his 726 series on games of 217-276-233 at Bowie. In later years, he also established house records at Fair Lanes Capital Plaza, Crofton Bowling Centre, and nearby Bowl America Odenton and Brunswick Columbia Lanes.

Michael first averaged 200 at age 17. He has averaged over 220 for nearly each of the past 20 years, with a high league average of 236.5 for 96 games in the 2002-2003 season. He also has scored 24 perfect games, 14 800 series and has won five amateur tournaments.

As a member of the Professional Bowlers Association, Michael cashed in 20 PBA regional events, during which time he rolled a 300 game and an 800 series.

He started working at Bowlers General Store in Colesville, Md., in 1979. Three years later, he and his partner opened the Crofton Classic Pro Shop, which has become a thriving business located just steps outside of Crofton Bowling Centre. Michael's business commitments often prevented him from competing in many PBA regional and area weekend tournaments, but he has made sure whenever possible to circle dates on his calendar for the association's annual Championship Tournament.

In addition, Michael has taken time from his busy schedule to support numerous charities and causes. He has worked behind the scenes and literally on the lanes with Special Olympics bowlers for more than 15 years, and he often has donated items from his pro shop and requested that the value of his recent USBC honor score awards be sent to BVL. Last year, he was publicly thanked in *BOWL Magazine* for his generous equipment offer to support a breast cancer raffle that was conducted during the NCAUSBCA Annual Meeting.

While maintaining his own admirable bowling record, Michael J. Warboy has served area bowlers for over 30 years, coaching, consulting, and drilling their equipment. His ceaseless dedication to the sport of bowling and his continued support for the association and its membership make him a deserving addition to the NCAUSBCA Hall of Fame.

Kirk S. Williams was born and raised in Washington, D.C., and graduated from Roosevelt High School in 1968. He then



worked three years for the C&P Telephone Company and received an honorable discharge from the National Guard approximately five years after entering the United States Secret Service Uniformed Division, for which he worked nearly 30 years.

Kirk was elected to the Nation's Capital Area Bowling Association (NCABA) board of directors in 1985 and soon was named chairman of the Awards Committee that he revitalized.

Kirk served on the Hall of Fame, Program Evaluation, Legislative, and Tournament Site committees and also did lane inspections for several years. In addition, he spent many hours in the office entering leagues into the NCABA computer system at the beginning of the season and keying in awards data for members who qualified for American Bowling Congress (ABC) and local awards.

Kirk has long assisted in bringing awards to bowling centers for presentation to league bowlers. He has conducted many

jamborees as well as numerous league meetings to work out various problems, and always has been available to help whenever and wherever needed.

Kirk attended workshops at ABC and United States Bowling Congress conventions for 26 years and at Virginia State conventions for 15 years. He also worked at NCABA, Virginia State, and NCAUSBCA tournaments. He served on the NCABA board for 21 years and currently is an NCAUSBCA director.

Kirk was elected fifth vice president of NCABA in 2000 and subsequently worked his way up to the office of president in 2005-2006, that association's final season. From 2008 to 2010, he served a two-year term as the second president of NCAUSBCA, during which time he oversaw the creation of the new Rerate Committee to help maintain integrity in bowling in this area. He also started NCAUSBCA's local awards program and plans to enhance it as funds become available.

Kirk began bowling in 1969 at Rinaldi's Riggs Plaza Bowl in Chillum, Md. His high game is 290—a feat he accomplished twice—and his high series is 769. He has been married for 26 years to his wife, Maxine, and has two children and four grandchildren from a previous marriage.

Kirk S. Williams's dedicated service on behalf of area bowlers merits him a special spot in the NCAUSBCA Hall of Fame.

Seneca Creek State Park—a radical change in venue

This year's NCAUSBCA Hall of Fame Induction Celebration will undergo a radical change in venue when the 48th annual gathering takes place at Blue Jay Pavilion at Seneca Creek State Park in Gaithersburg, Md., on Saturday, October 8 beginning at 1 p.m.

"It is indeed a different setting—no doubt about that," said Hall of Fame Committee Chairperson Yvonne Humphries. "However, there will still be Hall of Fame induction ceremonies, and this year's inductees and the current Hall of Famers who appear will be treated with the same degree of honor and respect each has received at past induction celebrations."

NCAUSBCA's Hall of Fame "Class of 2011" consists of Hollis F. McMullen, Michael J. Warboy, and Kirk S. Williams.

The change from the traditional semi-formal affair to one less formal shouldn't matter, noted Humphries.

"I don't believe the individuals who recently were inducted into the National Football League Hall of Fame felt they were slighted or being disrespected

in any way by the casual attire worn by those who attended that event," she said. "The one big difference is that those who attend our event will get to eat and eat well!"

The bowling association's "all you can eat" affair will be catered by Strong's BBQ, with ribs, chicken, hot dogs, and hamburgers on the menu and baked beans and cole slaw available as side dishes. Sodas and water will be included, and there also will be beer from a keg that will be sold by the cup.

The committee believes that a pavilion-in-the-park setting, along with a casual dress code and a lower ticket price—not to mention the introduction of a children's ticket—might just be the ticket to bring out entire families as well as younger adult and youth bowlers.

"We want this year's event to be one for *all* of our bowlers, not just the bowling insiders," Humphries said. "We hope those who never have considered attending such an event will come out and enjoy a fall Saturday afternoon with us."

Learn to let your natural abilities take over

Q. When I hit the lanes to practice, I do very well. My armswing is constant. I am very accurate, with good timing and a decent/constant release. However, when I am in league, I begin to struggle a lot. The aspects that I practiced I cannot repeat, and it gets in my head, and I start to do very poorly. When I am at practice, I take one shot after the other, and my muscle memory becomes sharp. In league, it takes a while from shot to shot, and I cannot seem to get into a rhythm. Any advice that you can give me to improve on this would be greatly appreciated.

A. You are correct: In practice, things move faster, and that helps keep things sharp. League is slower and has consequences, but you know how to bowl; I can tell that from your story. Now even at a slower pace, you should be able to get some rhythm.

My feeling from reading your story is

that you are trying way too hard. Relax, have some fun, and don't take a bad shot to heart.

Here is my approach to this problem when it crops up: Pretend you are writing a reply like I am now on the computer. You think about what you want to say and how to say it. Then when you are done, you hit "send" and your message goes out—no changing it now, it is done.

Your bowling shot should be like that. Think about what you want to do and how to do it. Then when you get up on the approach look at your mark, start your approach and hit the send button. Let your natural abilities take over. You have them, you do it in practice, just let it happen.

Q. I bowled my first PBA senior regional tour stop this past weekend and got my be-

hind kicked on the long oil pattern. It seemed the better players had the same thing in common: They had at some point in their life been ball drillers or pro shop owners. Being somewhat new to the sport (third season of bowling), I realize better lane adjustment decisions would have helped, but having a better understanding of pin placement, coverstock, and weight blocks would have been a major help in deciding which ball to use and when to change.

I've been searching the Web trying to find the answers. It seems all I can come up with is bits and pieces—no comprehensive information source without going to drilling school. My driller has spent a few minutes here and there trying to explain the subject, and I pepper him with questions every time I see him. Is there a source or DVD course that's not a scam or waste of money you could recommend?

A. You have hit on a subject that I hear many times: *Where can I go to learn?* Well, it seems this is one of the problems with our game today. Bowling has become more complicated because of lane conditioning and all the weight blocks and surfaces available. I also have no one-stop answer for you.

Most of the bowlers you bowled against and myself have learned by trial-and-error over time, or they have a good coach and a very good ball drilling expert who can shorten the learning curve. So my advice first would be to find a coach that knows bowling balls well, coverstock, and weight blocks. If there is not one of these in your area, write to some.

Bill Hall comes to mind; he will do things over the Internet with you. He will charge you, but I don't think it would be out of line.

You could also take a Dick Ritger class and ask for special help with lane reading and equipment choices. This also will cost, but these are a few days and very worthwhile.

Another thing you could do is find a very good ball driller who knows the balls and weight blocks. Pay him to watch your game and make suggestions on an arsenal. Pick his brain as to the best times to use the different balls.

You need time and undivided attention to learn; that is why I suggest payment. Knowledge is worth the price. If you don't think your driller or coach is

doing the job, you need to search one out. Ask the bowlers who stuffed you last weekend; they have people who are helping them.

Q. *I take the summer off from bowling, but the new season is going to start soon. I usually don't bowl again until the first night of league. This year, I want to start the season off in better shape. How can I get back into the game without spending all of my time at the lanes?*

A. The first thing I would do is take your equipment to your pro shop and make sure everything fits, and make sure everything is clean and resurfaced if needed.

Then start easy; you haven't bowled in three-plus months. You don't want to strain or pull muscles. Stretch out before starting and just bowl a game or two a couple of times the first week of August.

Increase to your normal league amount

of games the second week three or four games. During Weeks 3 and 4, increase to three times a week if possible, and be sure and go to the center on the night you regularly bowl at the time you bowl. This will get you back into the season routine.

As you are doing this, don't look at your score or care about it, this is practice. In fact, you could throw at spares first like the 7- and 10-pin and your strike ball second. You will get more shots for your money and be better on your spares.

Here is a question for you: *What do you get for a strike in practice?* Answer: One less shot!

Q. *I am a 65-year-old male adult, and I'm considering dropping my ball weight from 15 to 14 pounds. I was advised by my pro shop that it will be easier to rev a lighter ball, and faster ball speed can be attained. Is this true? What is the downside to such a change in the ball weight? Will I have to tweak my steps to*

retain my good timing, and will a lighter ball have a significant difference in its reaction? Please advise.

A. You can turn a lighter ball harder and also throw it harder. It will not take long to get your timing with the lighter ball.

When I tried the lighter ball, because of more speed, the ball retains more energy for back-end reaction. I found the 14-pound ball hit harder than my 15, but the downside was I left more solid 7's and 8's and even 9's than with my 15.

Along with that, I felt that I left a few more weak 10-pins, so I went back to 15 pounds. But 14's do hit just as hard and are very controllable, so if you need the extra speed, it is worth a try. You can also bowl longer with the lighter ball.



➤ **1961** – An organizational meeting is held Saturday, August 19 at 4 p.m. in the ballroom on second floor of the Masonic Temple, located at 10th and U Streets NW in Washington, D.C., and a national representative is invited. Upon completion of business, the Greater Washington Bowling Senate is officially chartered and its first elected officers are: James Minor, president; Fred Coleman, vice president; **Martha Burton**, secretary; Robert Edmonds, treasurer; and James Hurley, publicity/business manager.

➤ **1966** – On Friday, June 24, **Margarette Uncles**, a 45-year-old professional babysitter from Silver Spring, Md., scores 300 at Bowl America Town Center in the District to become the first woman in the Washington metropolitan area to roll a perfect game in a sanctioned tenpin bowling competition.

➤ **1985** – Senate King **Edward Woodbury** becomes GWBS's first National King.

➤ **1990** – Crystal D. Garner, daughter of Christine Thompson, is the first youth bowler to receive a TNBA scholarship award. She goes on to graduate at the top of her class in the School of Nursing at the University of North Carolina in Greensboro.

➤ **1991** – Senate Queen Johnnie M. Andrews is crowned TNBA Queen in Denver, Colorado.

To this date, this Senate has a royal court of consisting of seven National Kings and seven National Queens.




