USBC ALBERTA E. CROWE STAR OF TOMORROW

This award annually recognizes star qualities in a female high school senior or college student who competes in the sport of bowling. Star qualities include distinguished bowling performance on the local, regional, state, and national levels, academic achievement, and extracurricular and civic involvement. The award winner receives a \$⁶,⁰⁰⁰ scholarship.

USBC CHUCK HALL STAR OF TOMORROW

This award annually recognizes star qualities in a male high school senior or college student who competes in the sport of bowling. Star qualities include distinguished certified bowling performance on the local, regional, state, and national levels, academic achievement, and extracurricular and civic involvement. The award winner receives a \$⁶,000 scholarship.

USBC EARL ANTHONY MEMORIAL SCHOLARSHIP

If you are a senior in high school or a college student with a record of strong community involvement and academic achievements as well as financial need, you are eligible for

this scholarship. Bowling success is not considered in awarding this scholarship. USBC presents this prestigious scholarship in honor of legendary pro bowler Earl Anthony. ... USBC will award five USBC Youth members with a 5,000 scholarship. Candidates must be enrolled in their senior year of high school or presently attending college and must be current USBC Youth members in good standing. In addition, candidates must have a minimum cumulative GPA of 2.5based on a 4.0 scale (or equivalent). Individuals may win this award only once.

USBC ANNUAL ZEB SCHOLARSHIP

The award recognizes a USBC Youth member who achieves academic success and gives back to their community through service. Applicants must be in their junior or senior year of high school and must be USBC Youth members in good standing. This scholarship is based mainly on community service and very strong academic success. ... Bowling success does not factor into the selection process. The winner receives a \$²,⁵⁰⁰ scholarship and an expenses-paid trip for the winner and a parent or guardian to attend the awards ceremony, which is held in conjunction with the North Pointe Junior Gold Championships.

USBC YOUTH AMBASSADOR OF THE YEAR

This award annually recognizes one male and one female USBC Youth bowler for his/her exemplary contributions in the sport of bowling outside of league or tournament play, academic accomplishments, and community involvement. ... Each award winner will receive a \$1,500 scholarship and an expenses-paid trip to the awards ceremony held in conjunction with the USBC Convention in the spring. One of the winners may serve on the USBC Youth Committee and be eligible for additional scholarship funds. Youth Ambassadors selected to serve on the Youth Committee must be at least ¹⁸ years old as of Aug. ¹ in year of selection.

USBC GIFT FOR LIFE SCHOLARSHIPS

The Gift for Life Scholarships are available to any USBC Youth member currently in high school holding a GPA of ^{2,0} or higher and who can demonstrate financial need. USBC awards up to ¹² scholarships each year. ... Two of the six awards are reserved annually for children of fire department, emergency rescue, or police personnel. Selected finalists may be asked to provide evidence of their financial need. Award winners receive a \$1,000 college scholarship.

Is your league off to a good start?

Most of us are about to complete the first third of the bowling season, and there are a few things that should have been done by now:

Secretaries

- ➤ File the league certification application within the ³⁰-day grace period. Failure to do so violates the bonding program requirement.
- ➤ Give each team captain a copy of the league rules.

Treasurers

- Set up a bank account requiring two signatures to withdraw league funds and arrange to have the bank statement sent to the league president.
- Provide each bowler with a report of his/her payment history to date.
- ➤ Use an accounting system that can withstand an audit.

- > Monthly audit of the league's funds to ensure all is in order and to comply with the bonding program requirements.
- > Appointed a prize committee
- > Appointed an audit committee that should conduct an audit midway through the season.

If the league officers have accomplished the above tasks, your league is off to a good start.

Meanwhile, several centers this season have contracted with NCAUSBCA to process youth memberships. We currently are working with USBC to remove several "bugs" in the processing system, so I ask youth coaches and league coordinators to please be patient. Once the system is perfected, we will look into offering a more comprehensive youth membership package.

- ➤ This year's Senior Tournament at Bowl America Woodbridge had a great turnout with quite a few more entries than last year.
- ➤ The ⁵th Annual Mixed Tournament in Support of BVL is scheduled for December ⁶⁻⁷, ²⁰¹⁴ at Bowl America Shirley, so let's keep the enthusiasm going as it supports our veterans.
- Entry forms for the ⁷⁰th Annual Open Championship Tournament are being prepared and should be online and in your centers soon.

Is your league's handicap system fair?

A few years ago, I wrote about the inequities in many leagues' handicap-



did not agree with me. They were adamant that handicap should be capped at ²⁰⁰. Well, that's just not true. Maybe back in ¹⁹⁷⁵, someone who had an average of ²⁰⁰ was king, but that era faded about ³⁰ years ago. Now, with more consistent lane dressing, better bowling balls, and good coaching beginning in the youth leagues, ²⁰⁰ is still a fine average to have, but it is no longer the benchmark it used to be.

Previously, I showed a handicap that is limited to a ²⁰⁰ base unfairly punishes a lower-average team. They can almost never win against a higher-average team, even when they bowl well and the higher-average team bowls poorly. The good news is I have found more tournaments now get it, and almost all have raised their handicap base.

Unfortunately, many leagues, though, still do not understand that by limiting handicap to ²⁰⁰, they hurt the lower-average bowlers and condemn them to perpetually losing to the higher-average teams. What's worse is some small-average bowlers themselves vote to limit handicap because someone convinced them bowlers with ²⁰⁰ averages "don't need any handicap." They have chosen to wrestle the gun away from the good guy and use it to shoot themselves in the foot.

This example contains actual averages from a real ²⁰¹⁴-²⁰¹⁵ league that has limited its handicap to ⁸⁰ percent of ²⁰⁰:

Notice that even though the total team average of Team A (975) is higher than Team B (912), Team A gets way more handicap. How can that be?

Actually, there are several problems with the system used by the league. First, its handicap is based on an individual average of ²⁰⁰. Just looking at just these three teams, we see seven bowlers with averages that are above the base of ²⁰⁰. If ²⁰⁰ is the average limit for handicap, then all bowlers whose averages match or exceed ²⁰⁰ get zero handicap. At zero handicap each, they are deemed equal to each other. We know that a person who averages ¹³¹ is not as good as a person who averages ¹⁶⁵, so why do we say that a person who averages ²⁰⁹ is equal to a person who averages ²⁴³? Yes, they both average ²⁰⁰ or better, but they are not equal. By

DAVID DAHMS COACH OF THE YEAR AWARD

This prestigious award is named in honor of David Dahms, who was an instrumental leader in the creation of what is now known as the USBC Junior Gold program. ... The award annually recognizes a USBC certified coach who has been actively involved in a USBC Youth program and has demonstrated outstanding commitment to coaching, sportsmanship, and knowledge of USBC Youth rules for the last seven or more years. Any person or organization with knowledge of an individual's accomplishments in these areas may nominate that individual.

KERM HELMER HORIZON AWARD

This prestigious award is named in honor of Kerm Helmer, the team founder and longtime bowling coach at Erie Community College who also served as a board member, vice president, and president of the Young American Bowling Alliance, a predecessor organization of the USBC. ... The annual award recognizes leaders or organizations in the bowling community who have displayed the courage, determination, and ability to develop far-reaching programs of national scope that provide fun and exciting opportunities for collegiate and/or youth bowlers.

USBC YOUTH VOLUNTEER OF THE YEAR AWARD

This annual award recognizes an adult volunteer who has displayed outstanding efforts to foster, organize, and promote certified youth bowling programs at the local, state, and/or national level for the last seven or more years. ... Any person or organization with knowledge of an individual's efforts in these areas may nominate that individual.

limiting the handicap to ²⁰⁰, we pretend that they are equal ... but they are *not* equal!

A second injustice here is in assuming the bowler who averages ¹⁵³ plus her ³⁷ handicap pins—a ¹⁹⁰ total—stands a chance against the ²⁴³-average bowler. Is that really fair?

But the real inequity here is allowing the teams with the really bigaverage bowlers to benefit from all the handicap that the small-average bowlers bring to the team without having those pins offset by the higher averages also on their team. Look at the total averages of Team A versus Team C. The team averages are only two pins different, but in each game, Team A gets ³³ pins more handicap than Team C! This is because Team A gets to keep all of the handicap pins that their lower-average bowlers get.

There are multiple ways to right this wrong. One way is to make the highest average in the league the handicap base. Doing that here would change the handicap to one that is based on the ²⁴³ average. The handicap would be ⁸⁰ percent of the difference between the bowler's average and ²⁴³. Here's how it would look:

Although these handicaps would be fairer and more reflective of the averages, some bowlers have it hard-wired in their heads that ²⁰⁰ is the magic number that should not have any handicap. So for those who cannot come to grips with the idea that a ²⁰³-average bowler is *not* equal to a ²³⁰-average bowler, another way to approach the issue is to use team handicapping instead of individual handicapping. This neutralizes the advantage that big-average bowlers get when they are allowed to keep all of the handicap from the small-average bowlers on their team. Here is an example of how it would look using a team handicap based on ⁸⁰ percent of 1,000:

Now that is much better and far fairer.

Please take the time to review your own league and see if the handicap system being used is working for your team. If you see a problem, share this article with your teammates, and be sure you all attend your league's organizational meeting and vote to make things better and fairer.

Until then, practice hard and bowl well.

Getting up to speed; the importance of spares; lane adjustments

Q. I have been bowling now for over ²⁰ years. I have always had good ball speed, but recently I have noticed a considerable slow down. Because my turn on the ball is still good, the ball is hooking out of my hand. Is there anything I can do to get the speed back?

A. I have been bowling now for ⁶¹ years. I started when I was ¹¹ years old, so I know about speed changes. I also used to throw the ball hard. When I reached ⁶⁰ or so, ball speed went way down. Over the years between ⁶⁰ and ⁷⁰, I learned to make up for lost speed with ball weight and cover changes. Most

of my equipment went to high pin placements and polished covers to get the ball through the heads.

After a trip to the Kegel Training Center in Lake Wales, Fla., I realized that a big part of the problem is in the approach. When we get older, we tend to focus on being smooth on the approach; we have more even steps from start to finish.

I watched video of some of the top stars, and they all have one thing in common: They start with slow steps and finish with fast steps. A good person to watch is Chris Barnes; his last three steps are almost twice as fast as his first steps. This gives him momentum,

5, 214; 6, True; 7, False; 8, False; 9, Two; 10, Seven. 5, 214; 6, True; 7, False; 8, False; 9, Two; 10, Seven. and that translates to faster ball speed.

So in my case, I backed up on the approach went to six steps. I try to take the first three slow and pick up speed during the last three. Doing this has helped me to pick up about ¹¹/₂ miles per hour ball speed. I have to consciously think about it at first, but after a few frames of practice, it becomes more natural.

Q. I have been bowling for quite a few years now. I average in the low 210 s, but this season I have been slumping into the high 190 s to low 200 s. The shot we are on does not seem that much different. I have been practicing, but it has not helped. What can I do to get my game back?

A. Bowlers seem to have an aversion to taking lessons. If you golf and are having problems with your swing, the first thing you do is see the local pro and get help. Bowlers for some reason think they can do it on their own.

The other solution they have is to buy a new bowling ball. Now don't get me wrong—a new ball many times can help your game and here's why: You get a new ball, and you get caught up in watching the reaction of that new ball. You forget about the things that you have been working to correct. Many times then they correct themselves.

However, a faster way is to find a professional instructor in your area and take a few lessons. You can't see or feel what is wrong. A good instructor will see it right away, and then you can practice fixing these mistakes. After a little practice, you and the new ball will be the bowling beast you want to be. *Q.* You are always touting spare shooting over striking as the best way to improve scoring. Why do you say that as opposed to getting more strikes?

A. There are 1,023 different possible spare combinations. Many of these are unusual spares for sure, but this number of possibilities should tell you why a developing a good spare shooting system is paramount to good scores. If you don't have or know about a spare shooting system, ask your local pro shop operator or instructor to help you develop one.

Think about it this way: To raise your average ¹⁰ pins, you only need to pick up one more spare per game. Better accuracy on spares also will translate to more strikes because you will also become more accurate on the first ball.

Q. I am having problems with my lane adjustments. When I think I need to move, I try to make the move right away, but then I always seem to make terrible shots for three or four frames before settling down. Have you any idea as to why this happens?

A. You are doing the right thing by moving quickly; this can save you from a bad game. Your problem is your mind is not convinced you are making the correct move. You have to have complete confidence that the move you make is the correct move. Then you have to make the shot with conviction.

Next time you make a line change, believe ¹⁰⁰ percent that you are right; you will then make a good shot. If the result is not what you wanted, at least you learned something and only wasted one shot. Then try again. It's just a matter of trusting yourself and your game.

Q. I have been trying to convince friends of mine to bowl with me, but they seem to think there are few health benefits in bowling. Can you give me some health reasons to take up the sport?

A. You can tell them some facts about bowling. A ¹⁵⁰-pound person burns about ²⁰⁰ to ²⁵⁰ calories in one hour of bowling. This can vary from person to person, but it helps with weight control if

you don't indulge in beer and chili cheese fries.

Strength training exercises use repetitive motion with weight. This is bowling—walking, bending, twisting, and throwing, all with weight. You are doing squats, lifting, and stretching, all at the same time.

Bowling helps balance, motor skills, and coordination.

Bowling is good for the mind; it promotes focus and problem solving.



Bowling builds social relationships and helps teach working together as a team.

All of these benefits are like joining a health club except cheaper and more fun. Plus, bowling today is in almost all cases done in a smoke-free environment. Bowling can be done at almost any age from 3 to 103 -and older!

I hope this helps to convince your friends.

Q. I recently have been pulling the ball way too many times. I went to a coach to see if this was timing or early turn. He did not see either; he just suggested more practice. Do you know of any other tricks that might help?

A. Several years ago, I read an article that said Bill Taylor, a well-recognized coach for many years, had an unusual practice method to help with trusting your shot: You start your approach, and in your slide step, close your eyes. What this does is help concentration; you have to keep your eyes on on the mark you want to hit. That mark has to be the last thing you see when you close your eyes or there is no chance to get close to it.

Closing your eyes blocks all outside interference. You won't notice anything around you. You will feel your armswing like never before. It helps you to stay down and completely frees up your arm. This stops any muscling of the ball. It helps you gain full extension of the arm during your follow-through.

You will also learn how to post after the release. Posting is holding your position after release, and it stops you from pulling up or back too early. You will learn to have complete trust in your physical

game. It is a great practice tool. It is also fun after you get over the fear of where you might throw the ball.

As a footnote, I tried this a few years ago for a full season during league and even tournaments. I averaged ²²⁰-plus, finished high in several tournaments, and even had a ³⁰⁰ in Las Vegas at a Senior High Roller. I still go back to it even during competition when my game is off.

Don't do it in competition until you get very comfortable doing it. Do it in practice; it will really help your confidence and game.

The best part is I can honestly say I shot a ³⁰⁰ with my eyes closed!
