Nine Countries Set For World Open

SKOKIE, Ill. — The \$85,000 Brunswick World Open bowling tournament will definitely have a world-wide flavor this year.

Tournament Director Nick Hondros announced that all 17 foreign spots for the second annual event scheduled at Brunswick Northern Bowl Nov. 19-25 in suburban Glendale Heights have been accounted for.

"We will have bowling champions from all over the World this year," Hondros said. Japan leads the list with six entries followed by England, West Germany, Canada and Latin America with two each. Finland, France and Sweden each have been allocated one spot in the tournament.

Hondros also announced that the 90-minute televised finals will be shown all over the world via the American Forces Radio and Television Service. AFRTS operates 42 stations around the globe from Vietnam to Alaska to Europe and the Near East.

CBS Television will carry the finals live to its more than 250 affiliates on Saturday, Nov. 25 from 3:30 to 5 p.m. CST.
